Laurelwood Arboretum is located at 725 Pines Lake Drive West in Wayne, NJ. The arboretum is open and free to the public, every day, 8 am to dusk, except during emergency conditions. Public parking lots are located through the open gates on Vale Road and Pines Lake Drive West.

The Knippenberg Center for Education is located near the parking lots with accessible parking adjacent to the building. The center is open April through October, noon to 4 pm Tuesdays through Sundays. Accessible bathrooms are available when the building is open.

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## History of Laurelwood Arboretum

Dorothy and John Knippenberg, who were residents of the Pines Lake community, purchased the 30-acre botanical oasis now known as Laurelwood Arboretum in the 1940s and 1950s.

Known as Laurelwood Gardens, it was an active commercial nursery that specialized in rhododendrons and azaleas. The arboretum became renowned in the horticultural world for its registered hybrids, pristine natural beauty, tranquility and the dedicated expertise of its founders, Dorothy and John Knippenberg.

The Knippenbergs donated Laurelwood to Wayne Township in the 1960s with the understanding that it would become a public park upon their deaths. In 2006, it became part of the Wayne Department of Parks and Recreation. Laurelwood Arboretum is now preserved and maintained through an agreement between the non-profit volunteer organization, Friends of Laurelwood Arboretum, and the Township of Wayne.

## A Botanical Oasis

Each successive season at Laurelwood brings a new wave of blooms, textures and foliage to this "living painting."

From late winter to early spring, sudden bursts of color emerge, from witch hazels and snowdrops to crocus, daffodils and hellebores.

Spring bursts forth with a glorious show of azaleas, rhododendrons, peonies, foxgloves, primroses and flowering magnolia, dogwood and cherry trees.

Summer features daisies, woodland perennials including ferns, gingers and hostas, herbaceous pollinators and colorful annuals.

The appearance of asters, holly and dogwood berries and burnished canopies of brilliantly colored leaves signals fall.

Winter is the best time to enjoy the quiet dignity and delicate textures of hundreds of evergreen and deciduous trees, along with the stunning layout of the arboretum.
